Digital TV Conversion Hard Deadline Proposed

On May 26, House Commerce Committee Chairman **Joe Barton** introduced in the Telecommunications Subcommittee a "staff draft" on establishing a hard deadline for television to surrender their analog spectrum and transmit digitally only. Originally, Chairman Barton had proposed a December 31, 2006 hard deadline, but the staff draft established a date of December 31, 2008. Currently the conversion date is December 31, 2006 or when 85% of the consumers in the market are capable of receiving a digital signal. Barton's proposal offers no alternative to a hard deadline. Fortunately many concerns were raised during the subcommittee hearing and it was generally felt the "staff draft" was a starting place for discussion of legislation.

In Oklahoma there are 232,000 homes that receive television over-the-air and not by cable or satellite. These are homes occupied primarily by minorities and the disadvantaged. One of the alternatives in providing coverage to these "over-the-air" homes was the government providing a convert box to each one. In Oklahoma alone the estimated cost would be over \$11,000,000. The cost nationally would be astronomical. This does not consider those homes with cable or satellite that have television sets not on either service, but served by the stations' over-the-air broadcast.

The primary objectives of hard deadline legislation is to expedite the conversion from analog to digital and most importantly from the government's standpoint, the return of the analog spectrum for auction that will generate tremendous revenues.

Unfortunately, the most important person involved is being ignored ... the consumer.

Eighty-Percent of Oklahoma Delegation Sponsors Radio Bill

Oklahoma House members Tom Cole, Frank Lucas, John Sullivan, and Dan Boren have signed on to co-sponsors HR 998 "Local Radio Service Preservation Act." Representative Istook has previously indicated support for HR 998, but has not signed-on as a co-sponsor. Our thanks to Representatives Lucas, Cole, Sullivan, and Boren for their commitment to co-sponsor.

This legislation would prohibit the satellite radio services from carrying local programming such as news, weather and traffic reports. Satellite services are now advertising their coverage of college sports being carried by local radio stations through their network affiliations. The satellite radio services were licensed by the FCC to provide national programming only, but have ignored an agreement with the NAB and the original licensing intent by providing local weather and traffic reports in selected cities and developing technology capable of transmitting other programming.

If your representative is one that is co-sponsoring HR 998, be sure to thank him for his support.

The issue approved by the public was for the establishment of a State sponsored lottery and did not authorize any other lotteries. The approval of a State lottery did trigger previous passed legislation authorizing lotteries conduct by certain non-profit organizations. On another gaming issue, if you want to host a Texas Hold 'em Poker Tournament, don't! It's illegal in Oklahoma! The only places that can lawfully host card gambling games are Indian casinos with compacts with the State of Oklahoma.
